Our Church and its Mission

Individual worth is at an all time low. THE PARTY, THE SYSTEM, THE MACHINE, take top priority. The trend is toward the amalgamation of all races, creeds, and churches, with the line between ideologies, doctrines, and convictions becoming dimmer and dimmer.

More and more, the hideous evils of Communism are being whitewashed and camouflaged by our own Government Officials until the average American is coming to accept it as a system with many virtues and advantages.

The idea of one world church is also becoming so popular until people who do not have a burning personal experience of salvation are looking with favor upon such a merger of all denominations.

The history of the bloodly persecution of all non-conformists by the Roman Catholic Church for a thousand years is now being muffled and minimized to the point that this generation is forgetting the price that was paid in blood and human sacrifice to preserve our religious freedom.

In our own denomination, many men are measuring their success, service, and relationship to the church in dollars and cents. They are making comparison of our church, its buildings, its social standing, its prestige, its cultural advantages, with the older denominations. Naturally, in such a comparison, we come off in a bad light.

They forget that the great denominations have a history of hundreds of years behind them, that they have wealth, culture, training and have long since been accepted as popular among the elite.

They also forget that we are in our infancy, that we are not accepted on the common level with the great, proud, denominations. We are still a sect; but thank God, we have a mission to men, a Divine task to perform. We have been commissioned as custodians of the great, heart-warming experiences of Regeneration, Sanctification, as a second definite work of grace, the Baptism with the Holy Ghost and fire with speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance.

There are multiplied thousands of lost, dying men and women over this world that these larger churches will never reach with a message of truth, and a testimony of a heartfelt experience with God. They will go to hell if we don't reach and win them.

The time has come for us to stop making comparisons or contrasts with other older and larger churches. It is time to look to our own task, to fulfill our own commission before Jesus comes.

From all sections of the Conference, the reports are coming in regarding results from our Simultaneous revival. One aspect has developed this time that has proven very helpful and produced good results.

Several churches located in one particular area have gone together and supported one united revival; that is, three or four pastors have brought their congregations together and supported a big community revival. I have received re-

ports from two such meetings with a great harvest of souls.

Some of the other individual churches have had to extend their meetings because of the great revival spirit.

Success With Pioneer Girls

The first time I heard of Pioneer Girls was in Savannah, Georgia. I was there with a Girl Scout Troop, and on the same floor of our hotel was a field representative of Pioneer Girls with a group of Colonists. Coincidentally, that same day, Pioneer Girls was being introduced to our Conference at Lake City, South Carolina.

As I have worked with the youth of our church, I have observed the multiplicity of their needs. It has been a real revelation to me to know that there is an organization that has the answer to the individual girl's problems. Pioneer Girls may meet a personality problem of one girl. It may provide a new hobby for another and for all it offers spiritual guidance. The Pal Program, which gives each girl an adult "Pal," is a wenderful plan which may lead many of our girls to know Jesus Christ as their own Saviour.

Our Pioneer Girls were organized in July, 1960. Mrs. J. E. Litchfield, Mrs. B. D. Harmon, and I gathered our girls together from respective churches: Rehoboth, Johnsonville, and Hemingway, and with seventeen girls at our initial meeting, we felt that we had gotten off to a good start. Hemingway is now Fortalice number 3147, and our membership has increased to fifty!

During the Christmas season when our towns were having their parades, our Pioneer Girls were right in two of them with their covered wagon float. Behind the covered wagon (the insignia of Pioneer Girls), the girls with their neat blue and white uniforms, rode on another float. They made a very impressive sight, and since

Pioneer Girls is relatively new in thir part of the country, they created much conversation among the onlookers.

At each meeting the girls bring "shares," money which is put into the bank to go toward their week at Camp Cherith. The first Sunday of Pioneer Girls Week, we received an offering in each church to send to Pioneer Girls headquarters.

Pioneer Girls is for every age, beginning with the Pilgrims, Colonists, Explorers, Guides, Committee Members, and Pals reach almost every girl and woman in the church. Church behavior, personal hygiene, spiritual growth, nature study, missions, church loyalty, cooking, gardening, good sportsmanship, Bible reading, choosing wholesome reading materials, camping, fine arts, music appreciation, soul-winning, and many other areas are covered in Pioneer Girls.

Any church who would like to organize may do so by contacting the field representatives of their district, who will be happy to help in starting this program for their girls. We have found Pioneer Girls to be a must in our church. We hope many others will too.

Trained Teachers

From the Sunday School section last month the law of growth was highlighted. This immediately brought up the question, "where do we get the teachers if we divide classes and add new ones?" This question has prompted the article for this month, TRAINED TEACHERS, read it carefully and prayerfully.

Simply listing personnel needs and asking for volunteers from the pulpit may produce no response or may produce those who lack qualifications and fitness for service. To run down the aisle on Sunday morning and grab "just any one," hurry him off to a class, amid protests, is equally risky. Workers must be prayerfully and carefully discovered, enlisted, and trained if the important ministries of Christian Education are to be Christ-honoring and life-molding.

It is not hard to discover potential workers that need to be trained. You have them in your church—have you discovered them? Why not take the Church roll down and go through it prayerfully and you will be surprised at the workers you have who are living useless lives. Put the finger on them and introduce them to a training program. They are waiting to be asked. How about those

cager primaries and juniors, don't discourage them, use them and make them ready for a training program in the future. When you notice a young person responding for dedication, put them to work or you will lose them. Use them as assistant teachers, and that means use them at least once a month before the class.

Always be prepared for a negative response from some. But if the approach is right the negatives will be few. Challenge them with the fact that this work will outlast the stars. Also that their subjects are worth more than all the money in the world. Let them know that they become partners with God in a work which He wants done. Clinch it with the fact that they will be serving as channels through which God can change lives of others.

After you have enlisted these persons, the next step is to help them to see the importance of training for this important task. We must not overlook the necessity of consecration on the part of these we enlist, but to get the job done right, these sisters, CONSECRATION AND TRAINING, must join hands. Really, the degree to which the leader applies himself to preparation indicates the measure of his consecration.

Sunday School's number one need today is trained leadership.

There must be developed more new teachers and workers to close the ranks and spaces through which many are slipping from us. We are losing too many from our Sunday Schools to our churches.

HOW CAN WE MOTIVATE CHRISTIANS TO TAKE TRAIN-ING FOR THE LORD'S SERVICE? Here is the answer. When the pastor and the superintendent become enthusiastically sold on leadership training, they can commend it to the church. It has been said that enthusiasm is contagious. This is the missing link in many of our churches, void of enthusiasm.

News has reached me in the last month of other churches beginning the E. T. T. A. Course in their church. This is a sign of progress in the Sunday Schools of the South Carolina Conference. How about it pastor, have you talked it over with your superintendent yet? We must remember, we are ministering to a different generation from 30, 40, 50 years ago. They look for an intelligent presentation of the Book on Sunday. We can give it to them by training our teachers.
