## It Is Not The Act That Condemns **But The Attitude**

"THOU SHALT NOT KILL' \_\_ \_\_

Such a topic as the one which heads this article will be considered by most church members as a text that belongs to the distant past ,and has no part or lot among the Christian congregation of this gospel dispensation. I will admit that at first glance it appears unnecessary and might even be a waste of time if the people to whom it is addressed are New Testament christians. But assuming that those on the receiving end belong to the average class of pentecostal people that I have known and with whom I have had to do in the past twelve years and further assuming that the man in the pulpit is of the average caliber of those preachers that I have been highly priveledged to call brother; during the same period of time it may well be considered not only a timely but a timeless imperative.

It is true that it belongs to that ancient code of Hebrew laws that were marked out in the marble slate by the finger of Jehovah on Siniah's thundering summit long ago. And has, with the other nine, been laid carefully on the shelf of unused volumns for many years. It is hoary with age and covered with dust. But it is still an unchallenged principal that is a safe guard to human rights wherever men are found.

It is my purpose to take down from the shelf that commandment given to the sons of Jacob and interpret it in the light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and apply it to the unchristian conduct of church members of today.

1. A judge of Nashville, Tennessee, who tried 4,000 juvenile cases during the past four years, reports that only seventeen of those involved were in attendance at Sunday School at the time their crimes were committeed. Of these seventeen, nine were found not guilty. It is the judge's verdict that "children brought up in Sunday school are seldom brought up in court." — The Pentecostal Evangel

2. Army observers just returned from Germany say that the mortality rate in Berlin has now reached the appalling figure of 4,000 a day. Before the war that city had a population of 4,000,000 and a mortality rate of 175 a day. Now the population is estimated at 3,100,000 — The Christian

Bishop Remington, of the Protestant Episcopal Church, says that preachers should refrain from preaching on the subject of "Hell" to the returning servicemen because they have been through so much of it, and do not want to be reminded of it. There are thousands of ministers over the country who think a sermon preached on the sorrows of "Hell" is out of place. Read the Gospels and see for yourself the many times Jesus appealed to the fears of men as incentives to righteousness.
- 4. In the U. S. 36 murders are committeed every 24 hours. 15 billion dollars are spent annually to fight crime. Crime has increased 500 percent in the last 30 years. 18 million people are suffering either from Syphillis or Gonorrhea. -The Carolina Watch-
- 5. Shintoism, the national religion of Japan, no longer is sub-sidized by the government. All religions are to have equal freedom in Japan now, and must depend solely on their membership for support. Before the war there were 198 national shrines in Japan, the largest having 74 priests. There were also 49,000 local shrines. Connection of the Shinto religion with Japanese nationalism began only 75 years ago, and was skillfully developed to support reverance for the emperor and unquestioning obedience to the government. Instruction in the teachings of Shinto has been compulsory in the public schools. The emperor has catapulted from his chair of deity and Shinto must support itself. So we say "Many thanks to General MacArthur."

## **Bloodiest Crime** Wave In History Predicted For Nation

A nationally known authority on crime, John Wooster Martin, of New York, has predicted the "bloodiest crime wave in the history of this nation" in the next few years unless steps are taken immediately in urben communities to combat juvenile delinquency.

Martin pointed out that the nation's annual crime bill is now \$17,-000,000,000. He said, however, that the \$3,500,000,000 spent anif nually to combat crime were increased by \$2,000,000,000 the annual crime loss could be cut in half. In an address before the Exchange club, the criminologist said the chief revelation of innumerable recent surveys on crime was that "if we had better parents we would have less delinquency.'

He said surveys showed that the majority of delinquents in cities of 25,000 or over were from 10 to 15 years old, while 16-yearolds comprised the second largest

delinquent group.

"Official F. B. I. figures show that during 1944 there were more boys of 17 arrested throughout the United States than boys and men of any other age group, and that there were more girls of 18 and 19arrested than girls or women in any other age group," he said.

Mr. Dennis is one of the most pro-gressive, efficient, visionary lay-men of the South Carolina Conference. What could we do for the cause of the kingdom if every church had at least one such layman.

### THE STORY HASN'T CHANGED

The war-created want in Allied Europe is six years old. In China it's nine years old, and the tales of suffering are an old story now . . . But as long as the misery continues, it is a story that demands sympathetic attention.

This winter, no one of us can shut our ears to the story of Jacques Leblanc.

Jacques Leblanc was one of those who worked with the French resistance, fighting the Germans, paving the way for our landing. With the remnant of six thousand underground patriots who resisted so strongly that it took the combined might of enemy infantry, parachute battalions and bombers to destroy them, he was captured in a burning village. His last sight of home as he walked over a hill on the way to slavery in Germany was lit by fire. The village was in flames. His wife, with the families of the other prisoners, huddled by the roadside crying a feeble goodbye.

Jacques Leblanc returned five years later, skinny, pale, still in his prison rags. ager to go home, he didn't know what he would find at the village.

With other returning soldiers, he ate black bread and drank ersatz coffee at the returnees' headquarters before starting home. There was no other food to give them. There was no clothing to replace what remained of their prison suits . . . some environment. There are some who are warm and well-clad in the devastated nations - the twenty-five million who received the clothing contributed by us in the spring — but they are a very small minority. In those countries, the mark of the war will remain for the next generation. The children are undernourished and ill-clothed. For four or more years of enemy occupation they were robbed of the opportunity for health and growth which is the inherent right of every child.

We can't give back to these children of the war the five years of happy childhood which they lost. We can't erase the memory of those years from the minds of their parents. But we can help to wipe out the disease, cold, misery and shame which the years left. We can do it by sending the clothing they must have for warmth, health, life and self-respect.

The VICTORY CLOTHING COLLECT-ION FOR OVERSEAS RELIEF is asking for a hundred million spare used garments, shoes and bedding this month to ship to them. Give every piece of clothing which you can possibly spare. Clean out everything. The liberated people must have it if peace and plenty are to replace their crippling anguish. What can YOU spare that they can wear?

There is of course a neighborly appeal for aid to our unfortunate brothers across the sea, and this will serve to relieve the suffering and help to restore happiness to a land that is completely sacrificed on the altar of war. But one is reminded of the pathetic condition of the Man in the Tombs whom Jesus met when he crossed over to the land of the Gadarenes. The friends of this maniac had exhausted every means to civilize and tame his restless soul; but to no avail. They had clothed him and created for him a wholeshore and said: "hold thy peace and come out of him.

We may be sure that the great epide-Europe and Asia will need a greater remey than food and clothing. They must have this of course but when they have been fed and clothed, they will need to hear anew that old story of the cross. Yes, that story of the Good Samaritan who got down in the ditch and lifted out of the mud the fallen traveler, healed up his wounds and sent him on his way.

I wonder will the church rise to meet this emergency? Will she lift her voice in clarion tones and point a war ridden, sin weary world out of the muck and mire that is the inevitable aftermath of a Global war.




"As the mountains are round about Jerusalem, so the Lord is round about His people from henceforth even for ever.' Psalms 125:2

related, for national policy and international policy cannot be separated. This is one of the poists that so many seem to forget as they talk in terms of our will and our relation to the rest of the world. Unless we have a sound economic and financial system at home, we shall never be able to effect that which we think we can in the affairs of the world.

NINETEENTH: We must effect an affirmative American Foreign Policy. Some of its cardinal es-

sentials must be:

1. An effective balance between POWER and RESPONSIBILITY. This is the first essential in this time of LACK of POLICY and DRIFT that will lead to the undermining of the salient idealism about which we talk so much.

2. We must discard "free-hand" administration, which is merely a means of recognition that we do not have a continuous and affirmative American policy in a com-

plex era of change.

3. We must understand that Franklin D. Roosevelt's TOUGH POLICY of PEACE FOR GER-MANY is IN PERIL. If we do not try to escape history, we shall remember that is was the IN-DUSTRIALISTS that were first to undermine the WEIMER REPUB-LIC and lay the foundations for THE MARCH OF THE TWENT-IETH-CENTURY TO POWER and world destruction.

4. The explosion set off by the resignation of General Patrick Hurley calls for an immediate showdown in the China policy of THE UNITED STATES OF AM-ERICA. We must refuse intervention in China completely - or, as the General suggests - undertake it wholeheartedly. The time for decision is at end, for the struggle in China is merely a part of the all-round crisis in Asia and in the whole colonial system. The Chinese civil war is only a part of the PROBLEMS OF THE WHOLE FAR EAST, and this we must face NOW before we become so involved that we shall not have within our power the making of AN AMERICON POLICY that is worthy of this hour in our REN-DEVOUS WITH DESTINY.

TWENTIETH. We must face the facts and not merely the theory. In doing this, we must understand that FRAIL AND UNWORTHY AUTHORITY and THE HIDING OF ONE'S OWN IGNORANCE UNDER A SHOW OF WISDOM CONSTITUTES GREAT stumbling blocks in the march to the Heavenly city of ideas as weapons.

Our task, however, is to face the campaign of history with high purpose and soliderly courage, and and also with tough-mindedness flexible resource, and wrest what victories we can for the sort of world we have the will and the capacity to create.

act itself was all that the Jew had to reckon with. It didn't matter what he thought in his heart the law did not take effect until the act was committed.

This law was written on the door and the gate posts, worn as frontlets before the eyes. Repeated to the children from generation to generation and read in the synagogue on the Sabbath days. It stood as a stern monument before the eyes of the Hebrew day and night. It was a dead lifeless commandment that carried a terrible consequence to the offender.

But when Jesus stood on the Horns of Hatten, with the multitude sprawled along the hillside at his feet. He in simple direct language reached into the past and lifted those commandments from their marble resting place. He breathed into their lifeless corps and they "became a living soul."

Those laws that had only the power to kill, began at once to live breathe and move, out upon the stage of life. They became burning coals of fire, no longer written on tables of stone by the indelible hand of Jehovah but written by the finger of Jesus upon the hearts and conscience of men.

And the writing will last always. Yes, Jesus transformed the ten commandments, and read something into them that man had never known. He said in substance: I find in Moses law a commandment and says, "Thou shalt not kill". But I say unto you that he that is angry with his brother or hateth his brother is a murderer. He also said, your law says "Thou " but I shalt not commit adultery, say unto you, He that looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery." In a word Jesus said. It is not the act that counts, it is a matter of attitude. Not the stroke of the hand but the condition of the heart.

There are many degrees murder and the penalty for the crime, is of course, based upon the degree and the degree is determined by the measure of responsibility.

Jesus implied at least three types of murder in his teaching -Homicide, Fratricide and Suicide. Each of these he said may be committed without ever drawing the sword from the scabbard, or putting the hemlock to the lips.
