CONFERENCE BOARD HAS FIRST MEETING

The Official Board of the S. C. Conference held its first business meeting at Lake City, Tuesday A. M. September 25. The following are the findings and decisions of the Board:

(1) The Rev. H. P. Robinson was reelected Editor of the Conference Builder.

(2) A loan of \$250.00 from the Home Mission treasurer was granted to the Willow Creek church, for the purpose of completing the interior of the building.

(3) A loan of \$150.00 was also granted the Boltons Chapel church for the same purpose.

(4) Rev. R. E. Powers was asked, by the board, to move his family to Lake City, and live in one of the Conference houses in order that he might be nearer the center of the Conference and more easily contacted from all over the Conference.

(5) A. M. Graves appeared before the board with a request that he be restored to the fellowship of the conference by being licensed to preach. This request was granted after being carefully examined by the board, and upon the basis of his personal testimony that he had been completely reconciled to God and was in full fellowship with His Spirit.

PHYS President On The Field

Never before has this particular procedure been followed in this great work. The evangelization and salvation of the young people is one of the most vital needs of this generation. Never before has there been such a wholesale invasion by the Devil into the home and among the children of our land. And to a great extent the responsibility of counter-attacking this great onslaught lies at the door of the church. This is the Church's one great opportunity. Her last great chance. It she fails here she will fail woefully.

The new President of the Young People at the beginning of this Conference year is making an appeal to all of the churches to join in a great crusade for Christ among the youth.

At the present time Rev. Robinson is making a tour of all of the churches of the conference to explain the new program to all of the local societies. As soon as this tour is finished he will be available for revivals throughout the length and breadth of the conference.

Committee Report On Christian Fellowship

We, your Committee on Christian Fellowship, do hereby recommend the following:

We recommend that the Young People of our church set themselves apart as examples of Christian living, to counteract the moral looseness that is engulfing the world in the international crisis.

We urge that all young Christians enlist as crusaders for temperance. By temperance we mean a total abstinence from all harmful intoxicants such as alcoholic beverages, tobacco and unwholesome literature.

We recommend that our young people refrain from the immodest styles of dress seen today and that they dress modestly as becometh holiness.

We insist that our young people should not indulge in any of the present worldly amusements, such as the movies, public bathing pools and beaches, and commercial sports of any type, because they are definitely calculated to undermine their spirituality.

We believe, however, that young people should develop socially as well spiritually and we recommend that the pastors plan for their young people activities that will promote their Christian fellowship. This will offset the tendency among our youth to follow after worldly amusements.

We recommend that the leaders, in our local groups, appeal to their pastors for definite cooperation in their plans for social development.

We suggest a systematic study of the Bible and an organized prayer life as the basis upon which we may construct a permanent spiritual life.

We appeal to our youth to follow the Divine example of Him whose daily life was an open rebuke to all evil.

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The Work Of The Stationing Committee

The Annual Conference is the one great dates on the calendar of the Pentecostal Holiness Minister. He looks forward from one such event to the next one. The true minister is vitally concerned with the transactions of his Annual Conference; for several reasons. At the Annual Conference he gives an account of his labors and conduct for the past year. And upon the evaluation of his work his report is accepted and on the merits of his conduct his character is passed. These two things figure largely in the thinking and plans of the preacher from one year to the next.

The Annual Conference is comprised largely of what is known as "Committee work." Each elected committee deals with one phase of the conference work. Some are of greater or lesser importance, according to the nature of their particular assignment. But it goes without saying that the one committee, that is the chief concern of everyone, is the Stationing Committee. This committee is more or less, according to custom and tradition, a kind of mystical affair. Their work is done behind closed doors, with an air of secrecy about it. Into their hands is vested the appointing powers, which determine the assignment of every other member of the conference for a period of at least twelve months.

There is no committee, regardless of degree of importance, of the principals with which they deal, whose responsibility is as great as that of the stationing committee. Not only is their responsibility greatest but their work is least appreciated. Theirs is a thankless job. No one except an egotistical opportunist would seek a chair on this committee. In our conference alone there are almost eighty churches that look to this committee for good pastors and if they don't get who they want they blame the stationing committee. There are in addition to this, one hundred preachers to place in these pulpits where they can do the most good and best serve their generation.

As far as I am able to determine the work of the recent stationing committee was done in the fear of God, with an open mind to His will, with the interest of every church and preacher at heart, with kindness and consideration to all and malice toward none.

In listening to the requests of the various delegates, there was one requirement held in common by everyone.

Relocation Of Tabernacle Proposed

A resolution was offered at the Conference by Conference Supt. T. O. Evans, to move the Tabernacle to a more desirable location. The resolution was adopted by the Conference and the Official Board was granted the authority to investigate this possibility and effect such a relocation at their discretion.

The present location is far inadequate to accommodate the vast multitudes of people that attend the Annual Camp. The Tabernacle is by far too small, even though it will seat some three thousand people, it is too small. The Board requests the people all over the conference to pray that the proper thing and the most economical will be done in this matter.

Belated Report

Through an oversight this report was omitted from the last issue of the Builder. (Editor)

The P. H. Y. S. of Neeses closed a nickle contest the last Sunday night of July, with a watermelon slicing sponsored for the winning Reds by the losing Blues.

It is true that every delegate wanted a man that could preach. But there seemed to be one thing more vital and in greater demand than simply the ability to get in the pulpit and deliver a well arranged, homelitical sermon. The one thing that every delegate wanted to know about a preacher "is he spiritual"? "Does he have the victory"? From this common demand, and earnest inquiry your scribe was impressed with at least two things. The first is that almost any deficiency on the part of a minister may be forgiven and even overlooked by his congregation if the man himself, in and out of the pulpit, majors in spirituality. The second thing that impressed me was the fact that the laymen of our churches are still thinking in terms of spiritual development and progress. To me that is equivalent to the sound of an abundance of rain. Surely as long as the laymen, who are the very backbone of our movement, in this manner puts first things first, we are still on the road to great things and are "well able to go up and possess the land."

How often was a delegate heard to say. "We like our preacher, we believe he is a good man, but his sermons are so dry." The only thing that moves many ministers is the fact that they are not spiritual. And for this one failure there is absolutely no excuse. One might have a good reason for a lack of education or a poor delivery but no preacher has any excuse for being dry. If this one impediment could be eliminated from the ranks of the Pentecostal Preachers of the South Carolina Conference, the stationing committee would indeed be a committee of "Conference Delights." Not only that but the yearly transfer of preachers from one church to another would come to an end, and we would be far on the road to accomplishing the task for which we came into the world.

Committee Report

Finance:

We recommend the following:

1. That each local society maintain a budget—This budget shall consist of all tithes and offerings received in the local P. H. Y. S. excluding special offerings.
2. That we have a full time president.
3. That the president be paid \$100.00 per month plus 5c per mile for traveling expenses plus his offerings. And that the P. H. Y. S. Board be empowered to raise salary of President if they deem it necessary.
4. That the money be sent monthly to the Secretary and Treasurer of the P. H. Y. S.
5. That the Conference P. H. Y. S. Treasurer send the tithes to the Gen. Conference P. H. Y. S. Treasurer and if that is not enough that the local society will make up the deficit.
6. That the President be a member of the Conference Official Board.
7. That the P. H. Y. S. Official Board be empowered to elect district Presidents.
